Derek Thompson leaves home at 6.30 every morning, drives 70 miles to work and doesn't get home again until 9 p.m. To earn a living for his young family, it's the sort of tough schedule he's used to. Except that Mr Thompson doesn't have to earn a living any more.

Having won almost £3 million on the National Lottery, the 38-year-old father of two could put his feet up and do nothing more tiring than think of ways of spending his fortune. But, as his wife Elaine, 39, explained yesterday, Mr Thompson has decided to carry on working as a sales director with mobile phone firm Motorola to set a good example to their children.

"How can you tell your children to work hard at school and get a good career and then do nothing yourself?" said Mrs Thompson from the same home in Basingstoke, Hampshire, that the family lived in before their stroke of good fortune exactly a year ago. "I gave up my job as an office clerk because I couldn't bear to draw my wages when there are so many people who are desperately looking for jobs," she added, now a volunteer at six-year-old son Gary's primary school.

The couple, whose 11-year-old daughter Karen goes to the local state school, have spent a relatively small amount of their fortune, preferring to invest most of it. Mr Thompson has, however, swapped his Vauxhall Cavalier for a Mercedes-Benz to make his 140-mile round trip to work that little bit more comfortable. His wife drives her old blue Ford Fiesta. The family have also enjoyed a fortnight in Minorca, their first holiday abroad, and football fanatic Mr Thompson sponsored a game between two professional teams.


So are there any disadvantages to winning £3 million? "The only one is that it takes all the joy out of daydreaming," says Mrs Thompson. "Of course, you can daydream, but you don't want to. There's no pleasure in dreaming when you can fulfil any of those dreams a normal person has."
