There is nearly nowhere in the town centre without a trolley abandoned by some lazy shopper. Even trolleys which require a £1 coin in the lock are dumped in car parks, narrow streets or even at bus stops. Some people in Irvine have put more effort into making tools to extract the coins than they have into returning trolleys to supermarket car parks.

Year after year, the local canoe club undertakes a clean-up of the river Irvine, and the main debris they collect is supermarket trolleys thrown in the water. But the supermarkets, too, must share some of the blame for the mess in and around the town centre. Right now there are three trolleys in the car park in front of the police station in Irvine, and they have been there for at least six months. Drivers have to get out and move them around before they are able to park without scratching their vehicles.

One of the worst spots is the back of Global Video, just before the East Road traffic lights. In addition to filth and debris scattered around, there is a variety of dumped trolleys from almost every supermarket in town. They too have been there for months, although they cost an average of £80 each to buy.

At one stage, the former Cunningham District Council became so fed up with the problem, they decided to collect all the abandoned trolleys and charge the supermarkets £10 for the return of each trolley. This plan failed when the cleansing department ended up with hundreds of trolleys in their compound, and with all the supermarkets failing to take them back.

Once again, though, the general public are to blame for the dumping of trolleys. Pure laziness is the main cause. Rather than walk a few metres, it is easier to abandon the trolley, jump into a car, a taxi or even the bus, and leave it standing there.


