PART A

Read the following text:

As the scientists explored what was left of the Indian site, I walked along the creek and let my imagination carry me back 12,500 years...

A muscular man in his early 20s emerges from the tall evergreens lining the creek and hurries toward the settlement. About five feet two, he has black, shoulder-length hair and 5 wears only a hide strap around his middle. He shouts a cry of victory. In his hands he holds the huge tooth of a mastodon.

People rush out of a 60-foot-long, tentlike pole structure that houses the settlement's 30 or so residents. Built on a log foundation and draped with hides, the longhouse has 12 units arranged in two rows, like cubes in an ice tray.

The young man enters the longhouse. On a carpet sits a young woman playing with a 10 child. The man beams as he presents his mate with the mastodon tooth and tells her how he and his friends had found the mastodon mired in mud by the river.

As a grimace of pain twists his face, the woman notices a gash in his leg. She sends him to see the healer, an old woman whose hut lies apart from the others. The healer begins to 15 chant as she cleans the man's wound. Then she presses seaweed and boldo leaves into a chewing wad. The leaves are analgesic and hallucinogenic. As he chews the wad, the pain eases.
